

Reflections:

2020-2023 From Darkness to Sunlight



737 Comstock Ave

Looking back three years ago to 2020, at this time of the year, we heard grumblings about a virus that was getting some traction, starting from a conference at the Marriott Long Wharf hotel in Boston, At the time, COVID-19 was not the household word that now carries with it such a terrifying meaning: donning masks, isolation, ICU stays with no family allowed, political unrest, economic uncertainty, and conduct rules that seemed to change without notice, all happening with no end in sight. On top of all that, the chapter was accused by SU of a hazing incident in February 2020, leading to suspension of the chapter while the investigation was carried out. As you know, nothing happens quickly with COVID-19 around. SU shut down the campus and sent students home at spring break, which forced the closing of 737 Comstock Avenue, and shortly thereafter, there was virus terror across the country with seemingly no pathway forward-unfamiliar territory

Psi Psi: Survive → Thrive ARE YOU IN?

Psi Psi survived; it was not a foregone conclusion nor is continued survival assured. We do have a unique and fleeting opportunity to set a new path for a Psi Psi Chapter that avoids the mistakes of the past. We need alumni and particularly younger alumni to assist on this transition. The next 18 months are the most critical.

Since you are reading this, I challenge you. If you greeted a friend recently with the Sigma Chi handshake, I challenge you. If you have been to a brother's wedding, a brother's funeral, or gone on a trip with brothers, I

challenge you. If you have friends you call "Gooch," "Bullethead," "Batman," "Passthejelli," or some other wild nickname, I challenge you. Any of the above means Sigma Chi has had an impact on you. Now is the time for alumni to step up; we can't do it without you.

We urgently need more alumni to get involved. I am the youngest "new blood" on the AAB, and I turned 60 this year. If we don't get younger alumni involved, we won't survive. We need to pass along institutional knowledge we have absorbed. We have certain eras where interest and support are strong, but we are missing so many years of Psi Psis. In fact, we hear almost nothing from Psi Psis who graduated between 1995 and 2018.

We need to create a more active alumni-engagement program. (Anyone want to help?) As we work toward a more organized approach, there are simple things you can do to meet the challenge.

We are looking for relatively local Psi Psis to occasionally join chapter meetings, held every Sunday at 6:00 or 7:00 pm. Perhaps once a semester, see the house, meet the undergrads? We need a few alumni to participate in the April initiation. We routinely receive alumni dues from roughly only 90 out of over 1,000 living Psi Psis. We would love to have you join us at the spring clambake or fall Homecoming. Encourage friends or family sons, brothers, or nephews attending SU to check Sigma Chi out.

I understand many stopped paying alumni dues because the chapter has been suspended too many times. To be clear, alumni dues go to the **alumni association**, not the undergraduate chapter. They help pay for The Saltine Sig, as well as events such as Homecoming and the clambake. No matter what happens with the undergraduate chapter, dues are welcome to help alumni stay in touch.

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Psi Psi Ramsey Ludington '48 Enters Chapter Eternal

Ramsey Ludington '48 entered the Chapter Eternal early in January 2023. He was 95, and up until his stroke, continued to live what his family believes is a life of achievements. Ramsey was a Life Loyal Sig. He paid his Psi Psi annual alumni dues in May of 2022. He likely crossed paths at Psi Psi with brothers recently written about in *The Saltine Sig*, such as **Woody Vosler '46, Tom Woods '50**, **Dealton Smith '21**, and the Curran brothers.

Ramsey grew up and graduated from high school in Fulton, New York. After high school, he studied at Syracuse University. He served his country during World War II as a member of the US Navy in the Pacific Theater. After his military service, he graduated from the University of Miami Law School and returned to his hometown, where he had a private law practice for some 50 years.

Community was always important to Ramsey. He was a longtime member of the Fulton Salvation Army board of directors and was honored several years ago as a 60-year member of the Fulton Kiwanis Club. Throughout his life, he was a very proud American, who flew multiple American flags at his summer home at Mexico Point on Lake Ontario and sang "God Bless America," mostly off key every July 4th, as well as other appropriate occasions.

Ramsey was a life learner and became a licensed pilot and held a general-class amateur radio license. In recent years, he continued to take various amateur radio classes.

His most proud personal achievement was the building of his 32-foot Tahiti Ketch II, Ramsey's Dream, mostly during his retirement years. Ramsey and his wife Shirley got in their RV and traveled to boat build-

ing school in Maine and returned with a blueprint plan. His son Spencer Ludington '82 and family friend Tim Johnston '83 recall a crate that contained lead pipe fittings that Ramsey had gotten from local plumbers in Fulton. Ramsev and melted cooked down the lead pipe and lead fittings to form the lead keel of the boat that he would build. Twelve years later, he could be seen out on Lake Ontario, enjoying sailing his Ramsey's Dream, with its tanbark-colored sails.

Ramsey's Dream also sailed down the Intercoastal Waterway, a trip that started in Brewerton and ended in Key Largo, Florida. There were other sailing trips to the Oswego Harborfest, to Kingston, Canada, and to the Clayton Boat Show.

His son **Spencer Ludington '82** grew up with **Tim Johnston '83** and **Tom Johnston '80** in Fulton, New York. All become Psi Psis and were inspired by Ramsey's remarkable life. He was a living example of the Jordan Standard.

for all of us. Business were shutdown, all but first responders and medical professionals were sent home. It was an awful time.

Fast forward to summer 2020, House Corp. made the very difficult and well-considered decision to re-open the 737 Comstock Avenue for the fall 2020 to spring 2021 academic year, with strict limitations to allow only live-ins to use the property as a chapter house. We installed temperature scanners with facial-recognition technology to attempt to provide early warning of any potential COVID-19 exposure and to provide a means for compliance with the SU Stay Safe Pledge. While the fall 2020 semester was somewhat uneventful, SU closed the campus after Thanksgiving Break for the rest of the semester. Upon return to campus after winter break, before rush officially started, the chapter was accused of violating the SU Stay Safe Pledge when there was a gathering of more than 10 in an off-campus apartment to watch a hockey game, including a few potential new members and a few who were under age 21. This incident

led to SU charges of "dirty rush" and endangering minors under the age of 21 by providing access to beer. The chapter was suspended by SU and HQ, which resulted in not having a spring 2021 pledge class. Upon graduation in May 2021, the chapter headcount was down to around 50. With the chapter suspended by both SU and HQ until July 2022, we made the very difficult last-minute decision not to open 737 Comstock Avenue for the fall 2021 to spring 2022 academic year and to de-letter the property. While it was a very dark time, we embarked on a mission to comply with the SU and HQ mandates and to return to good standing. Weekly meetings were held with the Alumni Advisory Board, now two years since forming, and the chapter leadership, ultimately leading to the return of the charter by HQ and SU restoring the chapter to good standing. The property was reopened for the fall 2022 to spring 2023 academic year with 24 live-ins, only nine of whom were among the 14 remaining active members. With considerable support of HQ and the AAB, the chapter was able to conduct rush for the first time in two years, leading to the training and initiation of a pledge class of 28. Going into the spring 2023 semester,

the chapter is now 41 strong and looking forward to a recruitment effort, which is underway at the time of this writing, with the chapter seeking quality over quantity. Think Jordan Standard. It was an incredible effort by actives and alumni to pull off saving the charter from what would inevitably have led to the departure from SU for a long time.

Why share all of this? Well quite simply, a debt of gratitude is due all those undergrads and AAB members who participated in this thankless effort. My hat is off to all of you, with mega snaps for showing up when it mattered most.

The Challenge

We are no longer under SU suspension and are back in good standing with Sigma Chi HQ. We have 24 brothers living in the house and 41 current brothers. We own 737 Comstock Avenue debt free. We have a strong House Corporation and Alumni Advisory Board (AAB). An enviable position, yet we face significant head winds.

None of the current undergrads have had mentorship from older brothers; none have orchestrated or experienced a "normal" initiation. Almost all officers are new to the job. They have no experience running a chapter. Syracuse University and society in general have inaccurate hostile perceptions of fraternities. SU has continued its real estate expansion to the point where Sigma Chi is an island surrounded by university properties and soon-tobe new dorms. The Zeta Psi house next door at 733 Comstock is now closed and owned by SU. Getting waivers to live in a fraternity has gotten more difficult as SU wants the residential income.

We have a short-term opportunity to set a new path. The AAB has implemented a biweekly review process that includes chapter penalties to make sure the basics are adhered to: pay your bills, participate in the brotherhood, don't trash the house. Sounds simple, but experience has made it necessary to spell out those basic expectations clearly. We have stressed quality over quantity (think Jordan Standard) when it comes to recruitment. We have new by-laws on the recruitment and pledging of Sigma Chi legacies. They are key to a thriving future. The treatment of legacies in the recent past was not only disgraceful but set the chapter back in significant ways.

We have challenged the undergraduate brothers to become a Peterson Significant Chapter. The Peterson Award recognizes chapters that achieve excellence in all operations, including academics, philanthropy, recruitment, and ritual performance. We have a solid foundation to build upon. We have the finest

in New York City this fall to honor the careers of longtime IBM executive **Bob Lord**, Syracuse 1985, and financial service industry leader **Tony Huck**, Wisconsin-Madison 1985. Both were honored with the Significant Sig award in 2022. Hosting the event were Sigma Chi International Headquarters 72nd Grand Consul Tim Sanderson, Western 1985. and Sigma Chi Foundation President Ashley Woods, East Tennessee 2000.

I was happy to see a large contingent of Psi Psis, including Psi Psi Significant Sig Joe Durzo '67 and NYC Alumni President Phil Oldham '66 at The Players in Manhattan. The Players is the oldest New York City membership club still in its original home. The 1847 Gothic Revival-style mansion on Gramercy Park is a treasure of the Gilded Age and was a beautiful venue to honor Bob and Tony.

Since I had nominated Bob, I was invited to introduce him and to provide the assembled brothers a positive update on the status of the Psi Psi Chap-

The Sigma Chi Foundation held an event ter. Bob's family was there to help celebrate. I could tell Bob was touched by the strong showing of over a dozen Psi Psis. How great to have your friends, family, and brothers recognize and celebrate your success!

> Bob's comments included that becoming a Psi Psi of Sigma Chi was a milestone on his journey to success. He shared that being a senior VP in a worldwide company like IBM provides a platform to help transform the world. The Psi Psis then retreated to a local watering spot to toast Bob, share laughs, and tell tall tales.

> We've recently hung plaques at 737 Comstock for Psi Psi Bob Lord '85 and Psi Psi Nate Andrisani '92, who join the previous 13 Psi Psi Significant Sigs. Both exhibit the Jordan Standard. It was a great event; congrats Bob!
